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I trust that, as you read through this edition of Crosslinks, you will derive great enjoyment in being able to reminisce about years past. The following is a brief account of some of the activities and celebrations that the College took part in over the 2015 school year.

In 2015 our College theme focused on the core value of being faithful to our Catholic identity. Professor Gabrielle McMullen former Deputy Vice-Chancellor of Australian Catholic University notes that at the heart of Catholic identity is Jesus Christ and the salvation of the world, and his communion with God the Father and the Holy Spirit. Catholic agencies, which authentically manifest Catholic identity, will have Christ at the heart of their ministry. Those who work there are now his face, his hands and his presence in the world, as they continue his ministry of teaching, healing or charity. It is our hope that our young women who are fortunate to be educated at Clonard are equipped with the knowledge and skills to make a difference to our society and will feel the responsibility to do so.

Earlier in the year the College released its new five year building master plan, which will be a continuation of the extensive building and redevelopment program undertaken over the past five years. A key component of this plan is the establishment of a new Library/Learning centre that we believe will provide the space and resources for our students to maximise their learning opportunities. We continue to reap the benefits of the Tullow redevelopment and over the course of this year we have established a new Multipurpose Centre and Chapel that will be officially opened in 2016.

In the 2015-19 strategic plan released by Catholic Education Melbourne (CEM), Archbishop Hart notes that in Catholic schools students have the opportunity to develop their talents and abilities, their knowledge, skills and capabilities, across the many areas of learning and wellbeing, in particular those areas that enrich the human person. In this way, students live lives of meaning and embrace the possibilities and challenges of the future with responsibility and hope. The continual reflection and development of the learning and teaching program at the College is focused upon maximising the best possible outcomes for students. We have been blessed with an environment supportive of our students where there are opportunities for all to be their best.

In 2015 the College undertook a review in the area of Learning and Teaching. This was a chance to review each aspect of our learning program, seek feedback from key stakeholders and plan for changes that will assist the College in enhancing outcomes in future years. The external review panel were suitably impressed with the efforts that the College has made towards continued improvement.

On Friday the 1st of May 2015, the College sadly lost one of our long serving members of our Maintenance Team, Patrick Cryan. Patrick came to the College twenty-eight years ago after emigrating from Ireland. Over his time at Clonard, he contributed much, not only through his friendship and his sense of humor but in his fine workmanship that has been admired by many. His work, in particular his carpentry will remain for years to come as the legacy of his contribution to the improvement of our facilities for our students. Sadly, earlier in the year, Patrick was diagnosed with inoperable cancer and he passed away in the presence of his sister, Mary who had travelled from the UK to be with him in his last weeks and some of his closest friends. Many from the College and wider community gathered to farewell Patrick at his funeral Mass at St Mary's Basilica. Former Clonard Principal, John Shannon delivered the eulogy that recounted much from Patrick's life and in particular his contribution to Clonard. Whilst we are saddened by Patrick's passing we are comforted in the knowledge that he has entered eternal life and that his suffering is

We are thankful for the support of our College Community families and friends. As former Collegians of Clonard I am delighted that you remain interested and supportive of our school community. 





I'd love to join everyone at the reunion but living in New Zealand I just don't love you enough to cough up the airfare... So, special topic, My Life, one paragraph, time starts... now. Well after the glory days at Clonard I headed to Melbourne Uni where I did a BSc(Hons) degree, planning to do physiology and ending up doing psychology. I didn't spell it wrong on the application, I just loved it and wanted to help people, but from a distance. This meant I became a researcher.

I worked at the Anti-Cancer Council for several years evaluating the SunSmart programme, and working in tobacco control (increasing health warnings – yay!).

I did an MSc thesis on coping with cancer. I then fell in love and, being a feminist, dropped everything and went to the UK to join my bloke whilst he did his PhD in Classics at Cambridge. Well actually we had 18 very hard months apart first. In the UK Patrick and I got married and I worked at the Uni for 3 years doing research in genetic testing for hereditary breast/ovarian cancer risk. Patrick got a lectureship in Christchurch and, being a feminist, I dropped everything and went to New Zealand with him. And here we have been for 16 years with many ups and downs, particularly (and literally) during the devastating earthquakes of 2010 and 2011, from which our lovely city is still recovering.

I now work conducting literature reviews to inform clinical practice guidelines in health, and in recent years, autism. This work is so important that I have lost my job 3 times when 3 research organisations lost their funding. I now work for a wonderful woman as a self-employed researcher.

A key advantage is that I can work from home part-time and be up close and personal with our beloved kids, Zoe (14) and Luke (11). We get "home" to OZ once or twice a year and are busy seeing extended and extensive family (I blame the Church for this). A significant point of sadness was the death of my darling Dad to pancreatic cancer in 2008. Looking back over the years, it is clear that love, family and friendship drive my spirit and give value to my life, lessons reinforced in my time at Clonard.

Where has my life taken me since leaving Clonard?

After finishing at Clonard in 1985 I did not get any offers for university, so I worked for 12 months until I could reapply. I worked as a Junior Law Clerk at Vivian Hill & Co. Barristers and Solicitors. Mr Hill was the husband of Mrs Hill who worked in the library. I then went to work at Target Head office in the E.D.P department. In the meantime I reapplied to the universities and was accepted into Bendigo C.A.E for the following year.

I started a Diploma of Teaching (primary) in 1987 and completed two years before deferring for a year. In the year I had off I worked at a couple of School Holiday programs for the shire of Corio and then got a job at Morongo Girls College as their After School Care Coordinator and filled in as a Kindergarten Assistant when needed. I was asked to stay on the following year, but I decided to leave and go back to B.C.A.E to complete my Diploma of Teaching in 1990.

After completing my Diploma I applied to Deakin University to do my fourth year and was accepted into their Bachelor of Education course which I completed as an off campus student. After completing this course there was very little teaching work available as the Kennett government had closed a lot of schools, so I looked for other work while having my name down for Emergency Teaching. I eventually got a position as Assistant Coordinator at Glen Iris Primary School out of School Hours Program. During the 18 months that I was there I managed to get 3 and a half days of E.T work.

At the time I was boarding with friends of the family in Burwood. Their son owned a couple of Wendy's franchises and was looking for a Manager for his Forest Hill store. I left Glen Iris Primary School where I was only working 15 hours a week, to manage the Wendy's store in Forest hill full time. It was very much a change of direction for me and completely different to working with 5-12 year olds. I worked at Wendy's for 16 months and realised in that time I hated retail work

After 12 months at Wendy's I went on my first overseas trip with my then boyfriend. We went to Egypt, Italy and Greece. While in Egypt Craig proposed to me at the base of the Great Pyramid, I said yes and we got married two weeks later on a cruise ship in the Greek islands sailing between Santorini and Piraeus. We redid the ceremony when we got back to Australia as we did not have all the correct documents in Greece. Legally our marriage date is the Australian ceremony, but we celebrate both dates.

I went back to work at Wendy's when we got back to Australia and then Craig got a transfer with his job. We packed up and moved to the

ACT to live. I was not working when we moved to Canberra and was getting quite bored. I even got my old French books out and started relearning French. Eventually I decided to look for work and started applying to lots of Kinder's and Child care Centre's. I got an interview for a Child Care Centre in Belconnen, I didn't get the job, but they put my name on their relief list. I started getting some work at the Centre and they eventually offered me a part time position in their Occasional Care Room. I really enjoyed working in Ginnenderra Child Care Centre. My position was in the Occasional Care Room, but I covered breaks in each of the rooms, so I got experience with each of the age groups. I eventually decided to get some qualifications in Child Care and started studying evenings at C.I.T to get Associate Diploma in Child Care.

While studying I became pregnant and as a Diabetic, I had a lot of medical appointments during this time. I decided to defer from the course until after the birth and took Maternity leave from May. Christopher was born on the 12th December 1997 and again my life changed. Craig was an IT contractor and at the time there was little work in the ACT. We came back to Victoria to visit family and friends as Craig wasn't working and I was on maternity leave. Whilst in Melbourne at a friend's place, Craig decided to see what work was available down here. Within a week Craig had three job offers, so we decided to move back to Melbourne we would be closer to family and friends and Craig would have more work opportunities. I resigned from my position at the Child Care Centre and spent my days looking after Christopher and catching up with family and friends. When Christopher was in 4 year old Kinder I decided to start looking for work as he would be in school the following year and I would have more time on my hands.

I got a job at Spotlight in Box Hill as they were reopening their store in a new location and I was involved in setting up the store and was employed casually for the first three months. I was then offered a part time position. I had forgotten how much I hated retail work. I stayed at Spotlight in their Craft department for 4 years before leaving. I stayed at home for 12 months before deciding I was bored and was chatting with a friend from Spotlight who was now 2IC. She offered me some casual work filling shelves 3 days a week which I took. A new manager took over and offered me a position in the dispatch area doing Credit Claims for the whole store and writing up invoices in each departments general ledgers. After eight months in this position and more changes in management I moved back to the craft department in a part time role and then into the Manchester department. I still hated retail work and was always looking for something else.

I had gotten into card making and used to go to classes at a local paper craft shop. While at a class one day we were talking about jobs and I was saying how much I disliked my job and was looking for something else. The lady taking the class asked what I'd like to do, I told her I used to work in Child Care and had really enjoyed it. She told me she was Director of Surry Hills Baptist Children's Centre and that I should drop my resume in. Six months later I was asked to come in for an interview for a position in their Babies room. I got the job and put in my resignation at Spotlight and started work two weeks later. I worked for two years as a part time assistant in the Babies room.

During this time I looked at completing my Child Care qualification, it was a different qualification down here. I completed the work and now have a Diploma in Children's Services. I then worked as a room leader in the Babies room for the following two years and then stepped back to an Assistant last year as I had a lot happening in my life and need a little less stress and a bit more time for me. I put in my resignation in at the end of last year and am currently semi-retired until we need more money or until I get bored. While I was working at the Child Care centre the owner of the paper craft shop where I was taking classes asked if I would be interested in some casual work. I started working in the shop one day a fortnight and then after 12 months I started taking classes each term as well. I stopped working in the shop but I still teach a class a term.

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Kelly O'Shanassy (Year 12 1988)

Kelly is CEO of the Australian Conservation Foundation (the ACF). So, how does a Clonard girl get do that, do you reckon?

After Year 12, Kelly went to Monash University to study Science and moved gradually from the physical sciences to environmental science subjects and emerged into the 'real' world to work in environmental consultancy and from there to the EPA and from there to the State Government in the Department of the Environment.

It was in that department that she wrote the *Sustainability Framework* for *Victoria*, worked closely with politicians and where she saw clearly the important role that advocating for the environment plays in protecting the planet. She says that she saw that it was not necessarily people who chained themselves to trees who were the real champions- it was 'normal' people like us who can speak up. It was this sort of thinking and action that led her to the ACF.

Kelly remembers her days at Clonard as formative in many ways but only after 'nearly failing' as she describes it by trying to be the class clown in the early years – she now thinks that might have helped her develop the rebelliousness you need for the sort of work she currently does. She also remembers drifting between many of the groups which she says made her think and act a bit more independently.

The early 1980s are also remembered by Kelly for the drought and dust storms which helped shape her concern for the environment at a fairly young age. At Clonard she remembers laying on and walking along the hedge in Siberia (Out of Bounds of course), playing handball in the breaks and hiding in the lockers. In terms of a message to the students of today, Kelly urges them to stand up for what they believe is right, a sentiment so familiar to us in Brigidine education. She says to them that they can **choose** to do something that creates good and have a positive impact on the world.

"You can have a wonderful time at school... but get a great education too."

*Kelly has this year been in Paris for the 2015 **Convention** on **Climate Change**, working to forge a world-wide agreement about progress towards limiting climate change across the globe. Australian Conservation Foundation Chief Executive Officer

Kelly O'Shanassy

I came to ACF after several years as the Chief Executive Officer of Environment Victoria, the state's leading independent environment group.

In past roles I established world-first environment protection policies, authored Victoria's Framework for Environmental Sustainability and set ambitious water conservation and sustainable supply actions for Melbourne.

At Environment Victoria, I led the charge to boost clean energy, make homes more energy and water efficient and make recycling cheaper and easier. I worked to safeguard fragile ecosystems like Victoria's rivers from over use and successfully stopped environmentally destructive new coal plants being built in the Latrobe Valley.

I believe strongly in the power of people to advocate for a better, safer environment and future, I worked to build a 50,000 strong supporter base at Environment Victoria. Under my leadership, Environment Victoria was awarded the coveted Eureka Award in 2011 for communicating climate change and I was recognised amongst the top 100 business women in Australia in the 2013 Telstra Business Women's Awards.

I have advised a number business organisations on their journey towards sustainability, created The Future Economy Group in partnership with CEOs of responsible businesses, chaired environment and community committees for government, and I am a member of the Commissioner for Sustainability's Advisory Board and a Director of Tipping Point Australia.

When not advocating for the environment, I love travelling and kayaking along Victoria's rivers.





Loretta worked at the Geelong Football Club for 8 years in Marketing and has started a new role at St John of God Pathology in Marketing.


