All of us have been to school which means that we all have our own mental models of what 'school' looks like - routines, timetables, subjects, uniforms, sports, athletics carnivals, productions, debating, camps, excursions, friends. Not this year. This year as we navigated our way through the COVID-19 global pandemic we have reimagined all that a school can be. We have been agile, responsive and courageous. We have been learners and innovators. And to be successful, we had to partner with students, teachers and families like never before. We were truly #inthistogether. And for that, I will be forever grateful.

On 13 March, we were scrambling to make changes to our plans for Open Day to be held later that afternoon. From that day on, not just as a school but as families and the community, our lives were punctuated by press conferences and news bulletins where we would wait to learn the new changes we would need to implement into our daily lives. Hand sanitising and social distancing became our new normal and masks became a new 'mandated' accessory.

Everything that gave us certainty about school was gone when on 22 March, the premier announced that we were all going home to learn remotely to keep our community safe.

Our staff and students are to be commended for the manner in which they adopted and adapted to remote learning so quickly. Our awesome IT team had prepared early and with great foresight had us ready to go with Microsoft Teams so that we could stay 'live' with our classes and our College Leaders had a clear plan to support staff to be successful.

The openness and professionalism of the staff to embrace this new technology and way of learning, supporting each other and ensure we could provide the best possible learning continuity to our students during this time was truly inspirational. I know that for many of them it came at a great personal cost as they supported the learning of their own children while delivering classes online.

I also want to commend many of our non teaching staff who also had to reskill and turn their hands to improvement projects around the buildings and grounds in our College. They too showed the Clonard spirit.

Remote learning at Clonard was so much more that just classes. Our Student Leaders initiated Clonard Chronicles which connected and motivated the student population. Without events to host and coordinate Student Leaders turned their efforts and energy to other school improvement ideas. They became advocates for student voice in providing feedback to staff about what was working and what needed improving in the online learning space. This feedback was presented to teaching staff several times throughout the year.

Students told us that they noticed how much more independent they were becoming and how they were able to take responsibility for their learning in ways they had not experienced before.

Our students also lead a revision of our sports uniform based on their needs. A further highlight was our students hosting an online workshop with a panel of Old Collegians, who joined us virtually from locations both nationally and internationally. This had never been done before and was such a wonderful opportunity to tap into the wisdom of these extraordinary and successful women.

The virtual space became a canvas for creatively exploring other new initiatives such as memories of our history in 'Throwback Thursday' social media posts and the introduction of the Old Collegian Career Profiles. We are so excited about the increased connection with our Old Collegians. We received over 100 letters from them to present to our Year 12 students when they returned from remote learning for their last weeks of school.

Our new Wellbeing 2020+ framework was introduced this year with a new timetable, connection to a Wellbeing Teacher and a new Wellbeing Curriculum. If ever the skills and strategies for positive Wellbeing were going to be needed and put to the test—this was going to be the year. In the first 6 months of 2020 Geelong was saddened by the deaths of 5 young people. This touched us intimately and reminded us so powerfully of the importance of listening, reaching out, and seeking support. Our resilience was tested again when we experienced the direct impact of COVID-19 in our own community.

During this time, we showed fortitude, compassion, patience, courage and above all hope. And we got through. Through our wellbeing curriculum, learning about gratitude, self care, mindfulness, mindsets and character strengths have supported us during this challenging year. I think appreciation and gratitude have been hallmarks of this year. We have all come to appreciate the small things that we

have overlooked in our previous busy, overscheduled, frantic lives. We know that this year has generated a whole new respect for teachers and all that they do. Schools have also been elevated for the critical role they play in society.

We have also learned to appreciate our 'common home'. Ecological justice and sustainability have always been an important part of our social justice stance at Clonard. Maybe with less traffic and more walking, more listening and less talking we have learned to tread a little more gently on the earth and come to appreciate the rhythm of the seasons.

Our focus on 'Justice' almost became overshadowed with the demands of all things COVID. John 10:10 tells us that Jesus came so that all may have life and have it to the full. We know that there are members of our College and our community who are still waiting to experience the fullness of life —aboriginal people, asylum seekers and refugees, LGBTI+ and women. Through our virtual staff Spirituality Day in August, National Reconciliation Week and the actions of our Student Social Justice Team we ensured we have listened to voices, explored stories and brought the needs of the marginalized to the fore.

Amidst this global pandemic we managed to carry out our full School Review which included VRQA and Child Safe Compliance as well as a review against the Catholic Education Melbourne School Improvement Framework. Our Stewardship Council also commenced the beginning of a new Master Planning process to ensure the College facilities meet the needs of our community into the future.

No-one teaches you when you are training to become a teacher how to lead in a global pandemic. There was no rule book. So many days we had to make a call, back ourselves and trust this was the right decision. I was so grateful for the wisdom and experience of the College Leadership Team throughout this year.

What kept us on track was the compass of our core values – courage, hospitality, justice, compassion, wonder and above all hope. Schools were never built to be silent. Let us always appreciate the utter joy of young voices, seeing faces in person, and the power of human connection.

In 1965 Anita and I commenced our senior education at Clonard, we both came across from Our Lady's.

Anita and I had the privilege of visiting Clonard in November 2019 at the invitation of Dean Williams and Sister Geraldine Sheedy. Searching through boxes of old photos and memorabilia took us on a journey back in time. Walking through the grounds of the college and viewing the enormous changes and progress since our days as students over the past 50 years, was nothing short of amazing. The biggest impact was the wonderful state of the art library students today have the privilege of enjoying. In our day we didn't have the luxury of a school library.

Both of us enjoyed English and History. Regarding sport, my passion was softball while Anita proved to be a good swimmer and became the school's netball umpire. Softball was played at lunch time in what was back then in an open area just inside the front gates off to the right.

I left Clonard at the end of form 4 (year 10) in 1969. The following year I completed a Secretarial Course at Merindol Secretarial College, which was located in in Malop Street Geelong. Back then this was focussed on typing and shorthand. The employment climate was very different in that era – I was successful with 3 positions I applied for, and as a result I accepted the position at Ambulance Victoria in the office. I worked there for a few years. Then I married and had my 3 beautiful children.

Moving forward a few more years, I decided to return to study. My 3 children at that stage were in secondary school. I attended the Gordon for 2 years which inspired me to strive further.

In 1990 I commenced study at Footscray Tafe, driving back and forth from Geelong to Melbourne, while working partime. I received my 'Associate Diploma in Social Science' in 1994, gaining employment the following year with the Dept. of Human Services where I worked for 12 years, gaining a promotion in this time before I retired.

Anita and I still remain friends today. Our wonderful relationship has spanned 56 years! My most treasured memories are of our overseas trip together in Europe a few years ago, and closer to home the many coffee catch-ups we have shared, and I dare say will continue to enjoy for many years to come.

If I can offer any advice to those young ladies completing their secondary education it is this –

Don't sell yourself short of your life goals and ambitions – Strive for what you want, no matter what stage you are in life.

Many friendships were made and continue on till this day.







Studying STEM gives you excellent transferable skills in reasoning, problem-solving, critical thinking and communicating complex information.

Advice for Clonard students: So many jobs available now were not even conceived of when I was at Clonard. The world changes so rapidly, which creates new opportunities that you can't necessarily plan for ahead of time. Having a good breadth of skills and being able to adapt those in different environments is really important. I believe having the right mindset and being resilient will get you further than a final grade can alone.

After graduating from Clonard I went to RMIT to study Business Law. This was after the advice from my parents and teachers to get something "sensible" behind me before I pursue my love of acting. I lasted 6 weeks and quit the course, just before the HECS cut-off thankfully. I spent the rest of the year working in a retail job, saving some money and doing a little bit of travel around Australia. I auditioned for drama courses in September of 1993 and started at Ballarat University in 1994, this time studying Performing Arts.

Mindfully individual

Jae Allen's latest exhibition captures the colourful and unique celebration of gender nonconformity through her provocative paintings, writes ABBEY KING

HAVE you ever stumbled across an image or a sentence on a wall in the street that has really stopped you in your tracks, made you think and maybe even forced you to take a seakly pixel?

sneaky photo? Local artist Jae Allen, better known by her

sneaky photo?

Local artist Jae Allen, better known by her creative name myheadsajungle, depicts not only powerful imagery in her art but also thought-provoking wording.

Her works can be seen as permanent fixtures on walls all over Geelong, including murals at Geelong West cafe Box Office, Little Creatures Brewery and the city's Piano Bar.

She is a campaigner of human and equal rights for all and often uses her art as a way of addressing issues of social justice.

Jae's favourite part about producing art is watching people react. She says she will always value the responses of her family, friends and peers but she experiences an entirely different kind of rush when a piece of art resonates with a stranger based on what they see in front of them, not because of the person behind it.

"It's a different sense of satisfaction to get

the attention of somebody just walking along who bothers to stop and take a photo," admits the South Geelong artist.

"Just makes it a little more real for me." Myheadsgaungle's latest exhibition, Kiss My Glass, opened at Little Creatures Brewery last Sunday and is on display for the whole month. It is a combination of large image pieces and smaller text pieces, all painted on glass. The collection is largely inspired by gender nonconformity in the form of drag queens. She was particularly influenced by work of local performers and Piano Bar colleagues, Art Simone and Philma Bocks. "I have made a conscious effort to look around and be inspired by what's in front of me." she explains. "Coincidentally, the drag queens fell in my lap and it was like some sort of epiphany for me. "The thought of turning younself into a human canwas makes my head spin and I am in complete awe of them all."
From an outsider's perspective, Jae says her collection may appear to be simply about drag queens, but for her it's about expression – the

Brooke Williams



Brooke Williams has a goal in life, to change the image of a cardiac patient from that of an overweight person who doesn't look after themselves, to the reality - which is heart disease in its many forms can affect anyone at

Brooke was one of these people - a carefree 28-yearold fitness instructor and PE teacher, with a passion for highly competitive running. She was training for an elite 10,000 metre national running championship - when she collapsed.

After a series of tests Brooke found out she suffered from hypertrophic cardiomyopathy (HCM), a thickening of the heart walls. The walls between the chambers were so thick blood could not pass through. This is a condition that affects approximately 1 in 500 people however there are many patients still undisgnosed.

"It really turned my life upside down. All my life and social circle was centered around competitive sport. I had to change the way I saw myself and had to approach things in a completely different way, Initially, I really struggled to see another future for myself. The stress, uncertainty and lack of confidence in your own body, can be paralysing. Without the confidence that research into HCM and exercise gave me, I would be in a dark place not knowing what the outcome would be for me.

"If it wasn't for research... I would be in a dark place not knowing what the outcome would be for me."

"I am now inspired to get the message out there about Heart Disease. Get your heart checked every 2 -3 years. Know the signs and be informed and proactive. Because I think it's better to know, then you are able to manage your condition and prevent catastrophic events from happening".

Brooke came to our attention when, in the middle of Victoria's first lockdown period, she organised a Virtual Fun Run to raise money for Heart Research Australia. Not only did she want to fund research, but also to raise awareness of heart disease and to help get Australians moving through the first wave of COVID-19. She created a virtual event encouraging people to nun (or walk) 5km in May and to donate \$20 or more to Heart Research Australia. Participants uploaded their donation confirmation and data of their run to the Facebook event page. With the help of her mother-inlaw she also hand made some

successful participants. Brooke says her experience has taught her to focus on what really matters in life - to be grateful for everything, especially for what her body can do. Brooke and her husband are soon to welcome their first child so we wish them all the best and we are so grateful for

KRISTY Harris's hopes of world championship glory have received a timely shot in the arm, with the Geelong boxer dominating in Europe.

A four-time Australian boxing champion, Harris again proved her worth on the global stage, collecting gold and bronze medals in back-to-back tournaments.

The 25-year-old will now go to the worlds in India with supreme confidence, having claimed gold at the world title qualifiers in Perth in July.
"The whole trip was a vital

part of the preparation for the worlds," Harris said.

"I had five quality fights against international boxers, which made me even more excited and determined for the world championships.

"As soon as the tournament was over I was looking forward

to getting back in the ring.
"The worlds are five weeks away, so I'll head home for a few days before going back to Canberra for the last block of training at the AIS, where we will be joined by the Philip-

pines national team."
Self-funded, she flew to Europe for two warm-up tournaments.





